President-Elect's Message **Joanie Gillispie, Ph.D.**

September 16 will be our 3rd Dinner Speaker meeting at Noonan's Restaurant in Larkspur Landing with Fred Luskin, Ph.D. from the Stanford Forgiveness Project. There will be a no host bar and a fabulous dinner which will only be out done by the good company and the inspiration of Fred's talk.

An editorial review from Publishers Weekly describes Fred's work: Forgiving doesn't mean forgetting, insists Fred Luskin in "Forgive for Good: A Proven Prescription for Health and Happiness", nor does it mean condoning bad behavior. What it does mean is that you "take your hurt less personally, take responsibility for how you feel, and become a hero instead of a victim in the story you tell." Luskin, a practicing psychologist and cofounder of the Stanford University Forgiveness Project, shows why forgiveness is important for mental and physical health, explains how to form a grievance and suggests practical steps for healing. He uses examples from his clinical practice including instances of broader cultural grievances like those between Protestants and Catholics in Northern Ireland in this solidly researched and convincing guide. 1. Call to Order & Review Agenda: Grace Rogers opened meeting at 7:25 p.m., welcomed board members and reviewed the agenda.
2. Review & Approval of Minutes of previous meetings: Mark Kamena moved to approve, seconded by Beth Tabakin. M/S/P.
3. President Grace Rogers' report: The retreat will be next January 28, 2006 at Ann Buscho's home. Discussion of whether facilitator will be funded in the budget, not to exceed \$750. Roberta Seifert moved, Beth Tabakin seconded. M/S/P. Fred Luskin's speaker/dinner will be on September 16, 2005. John Preston's full-day workshop on "Mental Health Aspects of Aging and Long Term Care" will be on October 15, 2005.

Christmas party will be at Christine Gazulis' home on 12/2/05. Annual meeting will be on November 18 at Joanie Gillespie's home. February 10, 2006 will be the first speaker/dinner meeting next year.

All members on the EC are asked to send their job descriptions to the entire EC for review. They should be ready by September to pass along to new members.

Discussion of revisions to by-laws. By-laws are now more readable, with wording consistent with CPA's by-laws. The by-laws now address electronic communication, and provide for votes by email if there is 100% participation. All electronic votes will be collected and held with the minutes by the Secretary. All will be in

accordance with California corporation laws. Further discussion of by-laws is deferred to the September meeting. These and other changes to by-laws must be approved at the membership meeting in November.

Members discussed donation of \$100 to Psychology Shield, as in previous years.

Roberta Seifert moved, Beth Tabakin seconded. M/S/P.

Members discussed Board changes for next year. Christine Gazulis will be retiring from I & R but has found several possible replacement candidates. Newsletter will announce upcoming elections for Board positions and solicit nominations from the general membership. The following positions will be elected: Secretary, President-elect, Treasurer, and Chapter Representative to the CPA. Ballot will be mailed, and will include announcement of November meeting, renewal reminder notice, and reminder to check directory listing for accuracy or revision.

Members discussed policy about how to handle walk-ins to speaker/dinner, and how to encourage people to pay in advance for these events. Also discussed how to handle people who want to hear the speaker but not eat the dinner. Walk-ins will be charged an extra \$5 and if people do not eat, they will be charged \$15.

4. President-elect Joanie Gillispie's report: Joint hospitality social for Bay Area chapters of CPA in planning stages. It will be 3/24/06 after PAC dinner at CPA convention in SF. Discussion is whether MCPA can fund, and to what extent.

CPA is still looking for presenters for the convention. Call for papers deadline is in September.

Board discussed the idea from Ofer Zur to offer at 10% discount for online courses for MCPA members. Contact should be via the CPA website. This will be publicized in the newsletter and via the listserv.

Board discussed costs associated with the two upcoming workshops (Fred Luskin and John Preston). Reviewed flyers and target audiences. Discussed ways to reduce printing and mailing expenses.

5. Treasurer's report (Fred Rozendal): presented the current budget report. Any changes in the budget should be emailed to him.
6. Newsletter editor John Weir reported on newsletter ads.
7. Government Affairs Chair Mark Kamena requested that member return their CPA ballots when they receive them. Topic of CLASP representative deferred to next meeting. Mark urged members to write to our local representatives in Sacramento about the Governor's plan to eliminate the Board of Psychology. Mark will write about this for the newsletter.
8. Past President Sue Fleckles presented the proposed contract with Michael Mesmer, webmaster, for the new MCPA website. Estimated costs are \$2000-3000.

10. Roberta Seifert moved to adjourn, seconded by Sue Fleckles. M/S/P. Meeting adjourned at 9:20 p.m.

Treasurer's Report

Fred Rozendal, Ph.D.

As of June 1, 2005, MCPA has \$19,584.37 in assets. This amount is approximately \$4,000 to \$11,000 more than the treasury had on the same date on each of the last four years. The trend between 2001 and 2005 was a progressive decrease in funds on hand, until last fall. At that point, a joint CE program with CPA and MCPA led to a major turnaround in our declining budget.

Major upcoming expenses will include an integrated directory and web page (for which \$3000 has been budgeted), telephone and advertising expenses (about \$250/month), speaker-dinner meetings, and a possible CE program. Since income is also generated in dinner meetings and CE programs, these two expenses have the potential for being recaptured

Governmental Affairs/CPA Board

Yellow postcards were sent to every licensed psychologist in California, with instructions to mail a portion to Governor Schwarzenegger, to express opposition to the proposed merger of the Board of Behavioral Sciences and the Board of Psychology. The rationale for the proposed "Board of Mental Health" is that MFTs, LCSWs and psychologists all provide similar services. This proposal was done without any input from the public or psychologists, and would likely redefine the discipline of psychology. Psychology would have only one seat on the proposed board; this is significantly different from the current BOP which has five psychologists of the nine members.

This proposal would not result in any cost savings; funding for BOP is collected from license, application and examination fees that come from psychologists. No taxpayer funds are involved. Also, the proposed board would exclude psychiatrists, psychiatric nurses, psychiatric technicians and occupational therapists.

The BOP is currently undergoing a “sunset review.” SB 229 (Figueroa) would allow the BOP to continue to function as an independent licensing board. It is not too late to send a letter to the Governor and to tell legislators (Figueroa, McLeod, Campbell, and Horton) that you support this bill (SB 229). On June 28, 2005, SB 229 passed out of the Assembly Business and Professional Committee with an 8-0 vote and is expected to be heard by the Assembly Appropriations Committee in mid-August.

Thanks to the MCPA executive committee for voting to send \$100 to Psychology Shield for legal efforts to enforce the CAPP v Rank Supreme Court decision. Some of you may not know that after a recent agreement was reached with various physician and State hospital groups, the Union of American Physicians and Dentists (UAPD) and the California Psychiatric Association (CpA) have filed a lawsuit in Sacramento to block implementation of the new regulatory changes. It has taken us 15 years to get the regulation changed and it is time that psychologists take their rightful place in the health care arena. The CPA CLASP committee is looking for new members, dedicated, motivated, and collaborative individuals with diverse perspectives and backgrounds who are committed to: A.) The primary mission of the CLASP Committee is “to encourage the reduction of severity and frequency of professional distress and impairment at the state and local Chapter levels through education, early identification, information, and referral.”

The primary goal of the CLASP Committee is to assist psychologists in reaching out for support and developing collaborative communities of support across California for psychologists. Interventions include: A.) a web based Wellness Assessment Screening tool for CPA members to utilize and learn where they fall on the continuum from wellness to crisis; B.) Public Service Trainings for members on Self Care and Resiliency throughout the psychologist’s career – from student to retirement; C.) Collaborative and working relationships with local CPA chapters and the CLASP Chapter Representative to assist them in supporting their local community of psychologists, set up trainings, and supportive programs; D.) Relevant and informative articles published in the CP Magazine that will assist colleagues in identifying and addressing inherent internal and external stressors before they become a debilitating situation; E.) Develop and distribute a survey identifying the needs and concerns of psychologists; and, F.) Continue to monitor the 888 CLASP help line for Colleagues in Distress.

Feel free to encourage and invite psychologists from across disciplines to join the CLASP Committee as a way to make this program strong, effective, and reliable. The ballots for CPA elections will be mailed to CPA members on August 15. Two positions will be on the ballot: President-elect and Treasurer-elect. In addition, you will be able to decide whether CPA should add a new "Division of Clinical Psychopharmacology." It requires 2/3rds approval of those who vote. It is hoped that those interested in prescription privileges for psychologists will join CPA and help with advocacy for this issue. The ballots will not be enclosed in the California Psychologist magazine but will be mailed directly to you. I strongly recommend that you vote as soon as possible to avoid "misplacing" it or feeling that your vote does not count. Ask Dr. Betsy Levine-Proctor about her recent election experience (she tied and then won in a run-off) and I know she would say that every vote counts!
